Not the Rector's Letter.

Once again this is not the Rector's Letter, but it shouldn't now be too long before the Rector's Letter does appear here.

It is a great pleasure to be able to announce that the new Rector of the Wulfric Benefice is to be the Revd Christopher



Davis, who is at present Rector of St Nicholas, Tooting Graveney, in the diocese of Southwark. Christopher is married to Mary, and we hope that they will be with us before Christmas, though at the time of writing no date for his licensing has been fixed.

A longish vacancy has been made to seem even longer because of the Covid restrictions, but we must resist the temptation to say, "Good, now we can get back to normal." I'm not convinced that "normal" means anything more than "what we're used to". I remember when it was "normal" for no one in a cinema to be eating popcorn, but it was "normal" to come home from the cinema with one's clothes reeking of tobacco! It is now "normal" for people to wear face masks in shops; two years ago it would have been unthinkable.

"Normal" changes all the time. It is not something we should want to "get back" to, but rather something we should want to "move forward" towards. We should be looking forward to discovering what the new "normal" is going to be, and doing so with excitement rather than fear, and expecting that new "normal" to keep on changing.


For us as Christians, it's not a question of "what I like", or "what I would want", but of what God wants. Change is inevitable, but let's try to be sure we're changing in the right direction.

Things will be different because Jonathan Morris will be retiring soon, and it is unlikely that he will be replaced, so relationships within the benefice between St Bartholomew's and the village churches will change.

Please be praying regularly for Christopher and Mary as they prepare to move here. Be ready to welcome them, and look forward to "moving forward" with them towards whatever new "normal" is God's will for us all.



Looking to the next chapter

Back to school!' perhaps has never sounded so good. For those of us who found last year disrupted in terms of school, college or university, some of our young people and their parents might be really looking forward to the doors re-opening! And perhaps their teachers too!

The search for a new bishop

Following the retirement of Bishop Peter in May, the diocese is now looking to the future and taking the necessary steps to appoint the next Bishop of Bath and Wells.

As part of the process of finding our new bishop, people across the diocese are being asked to share their views. Hundreds of people completed surveys expressing their hopes for the new bishop in the summer and in September the Archbishops' Appointments Secretary and the Prime Minister's Appointments Secretary will meet with various groups of people in the diocese and then hold an open public meeting, where all can contribute.

The process is taken forward by the Vacancy in See Committee, a cross-section of people from across the diocese. The Vacancy in See committee has two aims, to consult, discern and prepare a diocesan Statement of Needs, a document which reflects the hopes and challenges for the ministry of the next bishop and to portray what is distinctive about the Diocese of Bath and Wells.

The second aim is to elect six representatives to join the Crown Nominations Commission (CNC) which is responsible for the actual interviews process.

Chaired by the Archbishop of Canterbury, the CNC, is responsible for interviewing the potential candidates before a recommendation is sent to Her Majesty the Queen. The appointment of a new bishop is then made by the Queen following an established process.

Simon Hill, Archdeacon of Taunton and Chair of the Vacancy in See Committee says, "Everyone, young and old, church going and non-church going, has been invited to share their thoughts through surveys and consultation."

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

'Bring the best of the first fruits of your soil to the house of the Lord your God' Exodus 23:19



LIGHT FIG TARTS <u>Makes 8</u> Ingredients 1kg Puff Pastry 12 Fresh Figs 4 tsp Granulated Sugar 3 tbsp Redcurrant Jelly

Preheat the oven to 220°C/425°F/Gas Mark 7.

Divide the pastry into 8, roll out each piece thinly on a lightly floured surface and cut into a 15 cm (6-inch) disc. Put them well spaced apart on 2 lightly greased baking trays.

Cut each fig across into 4–5 slices and arrange them slightly overlapping on the pastry discs, leaving a 1 cm ($\frac{1}{2}$ -inch) border. Sprinkle each tart with $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon of granulated sugar and bake for about 12 minutes, until the pastry is puffed up and golden and the sugar has lightly caramelised.

Meanwhile, put the redcurrant jelly into a pan with 2 teaspoons of water and leave over a gentle heat until melted. Set aside to cool slightly but do not let it set.

Remove the tarts from the oven and brush the fruit with the redcurrant glaze. Slide each tart on to a warmed plate and serve with the Crème Fraîche.

REMEMBERING JOHN AND PAM STOODLEY



Their 60th wedding Anniversary

John was born in Crewkerne to Albert and Marjorie Stoodley in 1922, passing away in 2013 at the age of 91, while Pam, born in 1925, moved to Crewkerne with her parents, Colin and Ethel Woodford, and older sister Mary, when she was a child. She died in June this year at the age of 96 at the Orchards Care Home where she had lived for the past 18 months.

John and Pam met during the war years and married shortly after in 1948 at St. Bartholomew's Church, settling into married life in their home town of Crewkerne where John worked with his father, Bert, as general house furnishers and undertakers. John was also a skilled craftsman, making and restoring traditional furniture and his skill was put to good use in St. Bartholomew's, at times.

These were happy years for John and Pam, welcoming their two children Robert and Marian into the world and finding their feet in the community. They created a happy home where friends were always welcome.

John became a member of many local clubs like the Round Table and the Rotary Club. In later years he was a member of the Probus Club and was a keen supporter of the Crewkerne Museum.

He was proud to be the Royal British Legion Standard Bearer for many years and on one occasion, had the honour of bearing the Standard for the Crewkerne branch at The Royal Albert Hall in London at the Remembrance Service.

He and Pam were staunch supporters of many local events, volunteering their time and efforts to the Hospital fete, Crewkerne carnival and of course, St. Bartholomew's Church, where they worshipped throughout their lives, making many lasting friendships along the way. Pam was, in fact, treasurer for the Church for many years. Towards the end of her life, she became less mobile, being unable to get about easily and then she suddenly lost her sight and was unable to attend church services as she had done. However, she never lost her deep faith.

Pam joined the Ladies Circle, Tangent and The Mothers' Union, which she thoroughly enjoyed until very late in life! She was a keen tennis player in her youth and loved nothing more than the outdoor life, so family walks, nature studies and picnics became the order of the day for the whole family.

Pam was skilled in calligraphy, incorporating many small watercolour illustrations of local scenes and wildlife in what she produced. She loved animals and regularly supported the RSPCA. Her rescue cat, Bella, was a great companion and comfort to her after John's death.

When their children had flown the nest, their holidays were spent exploring Italy, John's interest in Italian culture and hospitality having begun during the traumas of the war years. Pam too came to share his love of Italy, and all things Italian became their lasting passion.

John and Pam loved nothing more than seeing their family grow, having two children, five grandchildren and seven great grandchildren.

We will miss them both enormously.

BEGINNING AGAIN

Refugee Support Group held its Music in the Meadow fundraising event in July, seventeen months after the last fundraising concert, and I am glad to report it was a great success. There were five minutes or so of rain at its start but the sun appeared as the afternoon continued with the haunting sounds of the sitar followed by lively traditional folk music.

The appreciative audience generously bought raffle tickets, delicious cakes, recycled books and guessed the name of a teddy. In all we raised £1731.51 shared between Care4Calais in France and Safe Passage, the legal charity which exists to unite unaccompanied children with their families in Europe.

As you are aware from world news numbers of refugees are increasing as wars within nations endure and many autocratic regimes dominate and imprison their people; their stories are harrowing. Those fleeing disastrous climate crisis events will begin to make an impact. It would seem that the work of refugee charities and voluntary groups will long be needed, but nothing can be achieved without public support. We are very grateful to all our supporters, past, present and future for their understanding, compassion and kindness.

DEFIBRILLATOR TRAINING

On Tuesday 17th August at 7pm a defibrillator training session was held in the church and 10 people attended. Chris Cox came from Taunton to do the demonstration showing us the correct use of our defibrillator in case an emergency should occur. Chris works voluntarily in the Red Cross Centre in Langport and often does first aid training sessions, including defibrillator training demonstrations, in aid of the Red Cross. He travels from Taunton, where he lives, to different locations in the county in order fund raise for the Red Cross centre where he is a valued member of their volunteer work force.

On this occasion he brought three models and after his demonstration and following his instructions we were able to try out the resuscitation procedure for ourselves. It was a very interesting and helpful time during which he was able to reassure us about the safety of the procedure and explain the way in which it could actually save lives.

Our defibrillator is kept in the servery cupboard by the north door and is regularly checked to ensure that it is in working order. There are notices displayed in church in appropriate places so that people know that it is there and is available for use.

THE PARABLE OF THE SOWER *Matthew 13:1-23*

Mark:4:1-20 Luke:8:-4:-15





A farmer sowed some seeds in his field. As he scattered the seeds, they fell in different areas of the field.

Some seeds fell onto the path and the birds quickly ate them.

Some seeds fell onto rocky ground, where there wasn't much soil. The seeds grew quickly into plants.

But because the roots were not in good, deep soil, the plants couldn't get enough water. When the sun shone down they got too thirsty and the plants died.

Some seeds fell into an area that was full of weeds. As the plants tried to grow, the weeds got in the way, and the plants died.

But some seeds fell onto good ground, so the plants grew well. When they were grown, the farmer harvested lots of plants.

Jesus' interpretation

Jesus explained to the people who had gathered to hear his story what the parable means.

The farmer is like Jesus and the seed is like the message of God. Jesus sows the seed of the good news in different places, and different people react differently to God's message.

When seeds fall on the path and are eaten by the birds, it's like when people who hear the good news pay no attention. They carry on living their lives without Jesus.

The seeds that fall on the rocky ground grow quickly but then die because they can't take root. This teaches us that some people listen to the good news at first, but their interest has no real root. When these people come across problems, they give up on Jesus.

The seeds that fall amid the weeds are choked and the plants die. Some people accept God's message, but they don't fully commit to Jesus. They let other things – like money and worries – get in the way of their faith. Just as the weeds choke the plants, so these people's faith is smothered.

But the seeds that fall on good ground grow into big, healthy plants. The good soil is like the hearts of people who love Jesus, who hear the good news and rejoice. God's word takes root in their lives, and they remain faithful to God. Their faith grows and grows.


